



Pilkington FC - Club History - Long Read

Works teams in St Helens were amalgamated to form a Pilkington Amateurs AFC in 1933, however, because of the 5 years lost during the war it is officially registered as being 1938 when the club was formed. Little is known of the characters involved in the early years other than the club played at Crossley Road and had teams in the Liverpool Business Houses League and the local St Helens Combination League as well as 2 junior teams in the St Helens Juvenile Organisation League. Records show the 1st team being drawn against 'Liverpool A' at Anfield in the Liverpool Challenge Cup and that the game was played before a crowd of 2,000.

The club played its first games at Crossley Road and moved to Ruskin Drive at the start of 1948/49 season under the management of Mr W. Fish. Club tours were a feature of the 50's and on Easter Monday in 1951 the club entertained a team from Pontypool and beat them 9-2 before all the players and officials moved onto the Sefton Arms for lunch and drinks. In 1957, an Irish XI played the first team at City Road, St Helens and this became the backdrop of several end-of-season tours to Ireland in the late 1950s.

Throughout the 60's the club achieved mid-table finishes in the very competitive Liverpool Combination League. In 1965, the club took a trip to Germany to play in an international tournament that included playing against professional club, FC Langenburg. Under the guidance of Sammy Cottington, Ernie Swift and Ted Forshaw, the club became known in the mid-60's for its very successful youth set up. In 1966, Pilkington Junior won the Forster Cup, Woodward Cup and the League Championship Shield.

The Club were again playing in Europe in 1970, this time in Portugal. Posters advertising the game named them as Recs Pilkington de Liverpool and consequently thousands of Portuguese spectators flocked to the ground, despite admission charges, hoping to see the Anfield team. In 1972, ex-Crewe player; Brian May, took over the reigns at the club. It was his gruelling training sessions and the regular goal exploits of centre forward Ian Lancaster that helped the 1st team hold its own in the very competitive Liverpool Combination. John Delves followed Brian as 1st Team manager before Jack Potter took over around 1975. At this time the club was running three teams with the 1st team in the Liverpool County Combination and the other two teams competing in the St. Helens Combination.

In 1980, Sunday football came to Ruskin Drive. However the team, which was the youngest in the Warrington Sunday League was too inexperienced to make an impact. In 1983, older and wiser, the Sunday team won the club's first title. On a Saturday, the club continued to compete in the Liverpool County Combination until in 1983/84, the club was the first local side to successfully join the Mid-Cheshire League and finish in 14th place in their first season. Under the stewardship of Geoff Barlow, the 80's saw the first team struggle with the competitiveness of the Mid-Cheshire and were regularly finishing in the bottom half of the table.

1989/90 saw the arrival of Brian Yates as manager of the 1st Team but again he struggled to make an impact in what was a very competitive league. The club decided that it would be in the best interests of the club if the Reserves also joined the Mid-Cheshire League. They entered Division Two in 1990/91 and although finishing 8th, the 1st Team finished at the bottom of Division One and were relegated meaning the Reserves consequently lost their place. It was at this time that Lol Stanton and Jon Dawson, both qualified FA coaches, arrived at the club and in the 1991/92 season they narrowly missed out on promotion, finishing fourth in their first season in charge of the 1st Team. The start of the 1992/93 season saw the club elect a new Chairman, John Potter Jnr, the club's youngest ever Chairman who was still playing 1st Team football. A concerted effort saw them almost gain promotion but they had to settle for third. The club had always had a tradition of running under 16's-18's football but it is at this time that the committee decided they must look to the future of the club, to maintain its continuing improvement. So at the start of the 1992/93 season, under the guidance of Dave Burrows, a well respected figure in the ranks of local junior football, the club took on board Junior teams from Under 9's to Under 16's for the first time.

Season 1993/94 saw a change at the top with players, John Wright and Paul Pinder, forming a new management team. The new few years were a period of frustration as the club tried to get back to the top tier of Cheshire League football. Thrown in between this were 2 League Cup Final appearances that also ended in defeat. At the end of 1996/97, John Wright left the club and Paul Pinder ran the 1st Team with Andy Hockenhull. Season 1997/98 was the best year in that decade for the club as the 1st Team finally gained promotion back into the First Division. The club also won the Bill Gray Trophy - Club of the Year Award. The season after saw the 1st Team finding life in Division One tough and they finished bottom of the league. However, due to AFC Zeneca leaving the league, they managed to keep their Division One status, whilst the reserve side were re-elected into the Second Division.

Season 2000/01 saw Dave Burrows and Andy Hockenhull take over the reigns of the 1st Team with Chris Douglas taking over the Reserve team. Dave and his team brought a new, youthful look to Pilkington FC. Their first season was a huge success with the 1st team winning the Liverpool Junior Cup and finishing 3rd in the league, with club Captain, Lee Webber winning the Bill Gray Trophy - Player of the Season Award for the Mid-Cheshire league. The 2nd team also reached the Division Two League Cup Final, only to lose 1-0, to Styal FC but only managed to finish 11th in the league. While the clubs 3rd Team also gained promotion into the St Helens Combination Premier Division, as well as reaching a cup final. The next two seasons saw both teams finishing mid-table and in 2003/04, the Mid-Cheshire League restructured its divisions, with the creation of the Reserve Division. This led to the 2nd team dropping into this division, under the guidance of a new management team - Don O'Leary and Charlie Clayton. Again a mid-table finish was achieved by both teams. The following two seasons saw the 1st Team achieve mid-table finishes with the reserve team, under the guidance of Alex Wright, finishing 4th & 5th respectively. The end of the 2005/06 season saw Dave Burrows step down as manager of the 1st team. In the 9 years he was manager he stabilised the 1st team in the Mid-Cheshire league and won the Liverpool Junior Cup twice.

Reserve Team Manager Alex Wright took over as 1st Team Manager, but only 6 weeks into the season, Alex announced he would be leaving for the 1st team manager's job at St Helens Town. Paul Rees took over the mantle and the team only lost 2 games for the rest of the season finishing 5th in the league. They also reached the League Cup final, but were beaten 3-0 by a very strong Middlewich Town side that went on to win the double. The Reserve Team was taken over by Ste Palfrey and Dave Murphy. The start to the season was indifferent but from early November the team lost only 1 more game in the league for the rest of the season. Sadly, this run was not enough to win the league but they finished runners-up missing out by 1 point. The team also did well in the Presidents Cup, beating sides from the leagues above to reach the semi-final where they were narrowly beaten by Division One outfit Woodley.

The Club also reintroduced the St. Helens Combination side with Nick Robinson and Jimmy Woodyer building a team from scratch. This team started very well and remained unbeaten until Christmas, leading the way at the top of Division One and reaching the semi-finals of the Hospital and Northern Cups. Injuries and poor form saw their challenge for the honours hindered but managed to finish runners-up and gained promotion to the Premier Division.

In 2007/08, Paul Rees continued to push the 1st Team forward and they were only beaten at home twice and finished 3rd in the league. They also reached the semi-final of the President's Cup but unfortunately went out on a penalty shootout against local rivals Warrington Town Reserves. The Reserve Team began the season with huge promise after losing out on the league by one point the previous season. 7 wins out of the first 10 games put them in a good position to mount a challenge but a mix of injuries and in-experience led to a poor run from Christmas onwards which saw them drop off the pace and finished 3rd in the league. Jimmy Woodyer took over the running of the 3rd team. After winning promotion from the First Division of the St Helens Combination the previous season, the team was looking to establish themselves in the Premier Division. Injuries to key players hindered progress and they did well with limited resources to ensure the team stayed in the top flight of local football. Looking to build on the previous season's impressive top 3 finish, Paul Rees started the 2008/09 campaign with vigour but the inability to put a run of successive wins together meant that they were only able to finish 7th in the league.

Reserve Team Manager, Ste Palfrey, along with assistant Dave Webber, built on the previous season's squad and that paid dividends with the reserve team only conceding 4 goals at home all season, keeping an impressive 13 clean sheets and remaining unbeaten at home all season. They were crowned Reserve Division Champions with 3 games to spare - the club's first-ever league title.

Brian Cross joined the club at the beginning of the season as player/manager of the 3rd team. Injuries to key players hindered his progress with the team and unfortunately he resigned with only a few games remaining and Nick Robinson stepped into the fold. The 2009/10 season saw Ste Palfrey take over the 1st team manager's job from Paul Rees. It was a season of huge disappointment that started with promise. By mid-season they were 6th in the league but a run in poor form resulted in only one win in the last ten games and they finished 12th, only two points away from relegation. It was always going to be hard for the reserve team to repeat the previous season's success of winning the league as the team was broken up by retirements. The disappointment of losing the league on goal difference mixed with the ambition of some players to move up to the next level, the 2011/12 season was one of frustration for Ste Palfrey and Lee Webber as they struggled to replace the quality that was lost and they ended up finishing 9th. The reserve team did continue from where they left off but were pipped at the last post, finishing runners-up to a very strong Billinge side. They did however exact some revenge over them, when they retained the Reserve Division League Cup by beating Billinge in the final 3-0.

Club captain and Pilkington stalwart, Kenny Dixon took over the reigns of the 1st team whilst Lee Webber took over the reserve team with Dave Bierne and Ste Palfrey as his assistants. Anthony brought in a new squad of players who were experienced at a higher level. The season started very strongly and after the first 10 games the first team was top of the league. However, after losing a few players to injury and suspensions, cracks started to appear and Tony found it hard to keep together what was a very strong squad of players. On the back of some pretty heavy defeats, Tony decided to leave the position just after Christmas. The club then looked to Matt Potter to galvanise a new squad halfway through the season, this proved to be a very difficult task and the first team was relegated to Division One for the first time since 1990. The reserve team, under the guidance of Ste Palfrey and player/coach Danny Hughes, continued to develop and finished 3rd in the Reserve Division 2.

The 2015/16 season saw a change of management teams within the club. Club captain and Pilkington stalwart, Kenny Dixon took over the reigns of the 1st team whilst Lee Webber took over the reserve team with Dave Bierne and Ste Palfrey as his assistants. GROUNDREGULATIONS

Welcome to the Joseph Russell Stadium

We hope you enjoy the match and your experience with us today. Prescot Cables is committed to ensuring attendance at our grounds is safe and friendly for everyone. Your entry to the ground shall constitute acceptance of these Ground Regulations. CCTV is in operation for your security and safety.

All persons entering the Ground must have paid the relevant admission charge or be in possession of a valid season ticket or match ticket. Proof of age, where an age concession is claimed, and proof of identity may be required and must be supplied on demand.

All spectators must respect and comply with any lawful instruction given by a steward or an officer of the club. Failure to do so will result in ejection from the ground. Stewards can and will take photos and/or video for purposes of security, safety and crime prevention which may be passed to the police.

The following are **arrestable offences** under the Football (Offences & Disorder) Act 1999

- Throwing of any object within the ground without lawful authority or excuse
- Chanting or shouting anything that is considered indecent, racist or homophobic
- Entry to the playing area
- Entry to any areas to which spectators are not generally admitted

Conviction could result in a football banning order affecting entry to all grounds in the country and surrendering of your passport whenever England are playing abroad. You will in the first instance be ejected from the ground and where appropriate a season ticket will be suspended.

The Club reserves the right to make changes to any of these Ground Regulations from time to time. The full Rules and Regulations can be found on our website.

Supporters must not:

- enter the playing area **at any time** unless invited to do so by a **club official**
- enter the tunnel area around the changing rooms
- sit on the pitch-side perimeter fencing during games

Any supporter wanting a photo with a player must wait outside the changing rooms after the game.
